Additionally, financial and moral incentives for bilingual teachers can accelerate the preparation of specialists in this field.

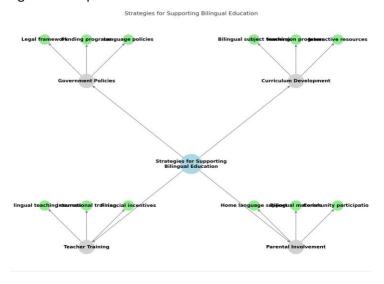
Parental Involvement. Parental involvement i essential for children's bilingual development.
