In modern English, as well as in Russian and Uzbek, abbreviation is applied to a wide range of lexical items, including the following categories:

1. Names of various institutions, organizations, research centers, and laboratories.

Examples include:

ASCEL (Army Signal Corps Engineering Laboratories) – инженерные лаборатории корпуса войск связи (США), “*Aloqa qo’shinlari korpusining muhandislik laboratoriyalari (AQSh)*”;

CEERI (Central Electronics Engineering Research Institute) – Центральный научно-исследовательский институт по электронике, “*Elektronika bo’yicha markaziy ilmiy-tadqiqot instituti.*”

2. Names of countries.

Examples: *Ca*, *Can*, *Sana*, *Cda* (Canada) – Канада, “*Kanada*”; *E*, *En*, *Eng*, *Engl* (England) – Англия, “*Angliya*”; *USA* (United States of America) – США (Соединённые Штаты Америки), “*Amerika Qo’shma Shtatlari.*”

3. Names of cities.

Examples: *Sacto* or *Sac* for Sacramento; *Chi* for Chicago; *Philly* for Philadelphia.

4. Titles, academic degrees, military decorations, and professional ranks.

Examples: *Dr* (Doctor) – доктор, “*doktor*”; *M.A.* (Master of Arts) – магистр искусств, “*San’at Magistri*”; *D.S.O.* (Distinguished Service Order) – орден за боевые заслуги, “*Jangovar xizmatlari uchun orden.*”

5. Abbreviations used in advertisements, addresses, and typography.

Examples: *col.* (column) – газетный столбец, “*gazeta ustuni*”; *E.C.* (Eastern Central) – Восточно-центральная часть Лондона; “*Londonning sharqiy-markaziy qismi*”; *mat.*(matinee) – дневной спектакль, “*kunduzgi spektakl*”; *tongt* (tonight) – сегодня вечером, “*bugun kechqurun*”; *perfs.*, *pr.* (performances) – спектакли, концерты, “*spektakllar, kontsertlar.*”

6. Names of days of the week and months.

Examples: *Mond* (Monday) – понедельник, “*dushanba*”; *T*, *Tu*, *Tues* (Tuesday) – вторник, “*seshanba*”; *Ja*, *Jan* (January) – январь, “*yanvar*”; *F*, *Feb*, *Feby* (February) – февраль, “*fevral*”; *Jul*, *Jy* (July) – июль, “*iyul*,” and others.

7. Military ranks and technical terms.

Examples: *capt.* (captain) – капитан, “*kapitan*”; *Lieut-Col* (Lieutenant-Colonel) – подполковник, “*podpolkovnik*”; *paratrooper* (parachute-trooper) – парашютист, “*parashyutchi*”; *sub* (submarine) – подводная лодка, “*suv osti kemasi*”; *R.A.F.* (Royal Air Force) – Военно-воздушные силы Великобритании, “*Buyuk Britaniya harbiy havo kuchlari*”; *A-plane* – самолёт с атомным двигателем, “*atom dvigatelli samolyot*”; *H-bomb* (hydrogen bomb) – водородная бомба, “*vodorod bombasi*”

In the last example (H-bomb), the letter H serves both as an element of a compound abbreviation and as a symbolic letter borrowed from the language of chemistry.
