

Diplomacy of The Timurid Empire

Furthermore, the research explores how Amir Temur used diplomatic correspondence, ambassadors, and political marriages as tools for expanding influence and preserving stability within the empire. Relations with the Ottoman Empire, China, Persia, India, and several European kingdoms are discussed as important aspects of Timurid foreign policy. The article emphasizes that Timurid diplomacy combined military power with political intelligence and cultural interaction, which contributed to the international prestige of the empire. In addition, the study evaluates the influence of Timurid diplomatic traditions on later Central Asian statecraft and intercultural communication.
