

Andijan Coins From The "Yangi Sanganak" Treasury Of The 15th-16th Centuries

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Abstract: The article describes 34 copper coins minted in Andijan from the "Yangi Sanganak" treasury belonging to the Timurid and Shaybanid periods, found in the "Yangi Sanganak" neighborhood of Parkent district, Tashkent region, and kept at the State Museum of the History of the Timurids, divided into 6 types. It is noted that the obverse of the coins bears the inscription "zarb Andijan" or "zarb Andigan" in Arabic letters, and the year of their minting in Arabic letters on the reverse, that the coins were minted during the reign of the Timurid prince, governor of Fergana region Umarshaykh Mirzo, and that some of these coins were re-minted and put into circulation during the coinage reform of the Shaybanid period.

MAIN PART

I. " New In the treasury of "Sanganak " In Andijan tattoo made of coins types

"New In the treasury of "Sanganak" In Andijan tattoo made to coins various decoration and Arabic records relief in the form lowered is , their on the surface decorations according to into 6 types as follows divided into:

Type 1. There are 19 coins of this type, some of which were minted in AH 898 (AD 1492-1493). The decoration around the edge of one of them is slightly different from the others. According to this difference, type 1 coins can be conditionally divided into variants A and B.

A – variant. A total of 18 coins of the 1st type A – variant have a weight of 3.0-5.3 g., diameter – 21-26 mm . 5 of them were re-struck. This is discussed in the

issue of re-struck coins (Figures 1:1 – 1:18).

Obverse: The inscription "zarb Andijan ()" is engraved inside a ring depicting النجان/ضرب four petal-shaped flowers arranged one after another in a circle and a bud of a rose standing next to it (Figure 2:1A).

Back side: After the inscription " fi altarih sana (في التاريخ سنة) ", the year the coin was minted is written in words.

B – variant. The coin in this variant is a single piece, its weight is 4.6 g, and its diameter is 21–22 mm (Figure 1:19).

Front side: Similar to variant A. However, the edges of the border are embossed with a four-petaled flower and a rose bud-like decoration, with the spaces between them being open (2:1 B - image).

Reverse: As in variant A, after the inscription " fi altarih sana (في التاريخ سنة) " the year of minting of the coin is written in words. However, some of the inscriptions have been flattened, and some have not been included on the coin.

Coins similar to type A - variant 1 were studied by AM Kamyshev in the Kyrgyz Republic in the Changit treasure, 8 in the Laylak treasure, 6 in the Aksi treasure, and 5 in the Aksi treasure, and some of them were found to have been minted in 898 AH (1492-1493 AD). (Kamyshev A.M. , 2013. – P. 123. $N_{\rm P}$ 28 (4b), – P. 139. $N_{\rm P}$ 84. – P. 161. $N_{\rm P}$ 60.) . Some of the coins of this type in the "Yangi Sanganak" treasury are dated 898 AH (1492-1493 AD). Based on this, it can be said that the year of their minting coincides with the reign of the Temurid prince Umarshaikh Mirza, the grandson of Amir Temur, the fourth son of Abu Said Mirza, the father of the king and poet Zahiriddin Muhammad Babur, over the Fergana ulus.

Type 2. There is one grain of this type of coin in the treasury, its weight is 6.0 g., diameter is 21–22 mm. (Figure 1:20).

Front side: Inside the ring, surrounded by a two-row "three-leaf" ornament, 8 in each row, 16 in total, overlapping each other, اندجان/ضرب is an inscription in Arabic letters "zarb /Andijan ()" as in type 1 (Figure 2: 2).

Back side: After the inscription " fi altarih sana (في التاريخ سنة)", the year of minting of the coin is written in words. However, some of the inscriptions did not appear on the coin, and some of them were flattened.

Coins similar to the 2nd type coins minted in Andijan in the "Yangi Sanganak" hoard were also discovered

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among the Changit and Laylak hoards, and it is recorded that they were minted in 984 AH (1576-1577 AD) or 904 AH (1498-1499 AD) (Kamyshev A. M., 2013. – P. 123. No. 31, – P. 139. No. 86).

Type 3. There are 8 coins in the hoard. 5 of them have the inscription Andijan, and 1 has the inscription Andikon (Andigon). On the remaining two coins, the place where the letter "j" or "k (g)" was inscribed has faded. Type 3 coins can be conditionally divided into two: variant A with the inscription Andijan and variant B with the inscription Andikon (Andigon).

A – option. 3rd round As mentioned above, there are 6 coins in variant A, their weight is 4.4-5.2 grams, and their diameter is 21-25 mm (Figures 1:21–1:27).

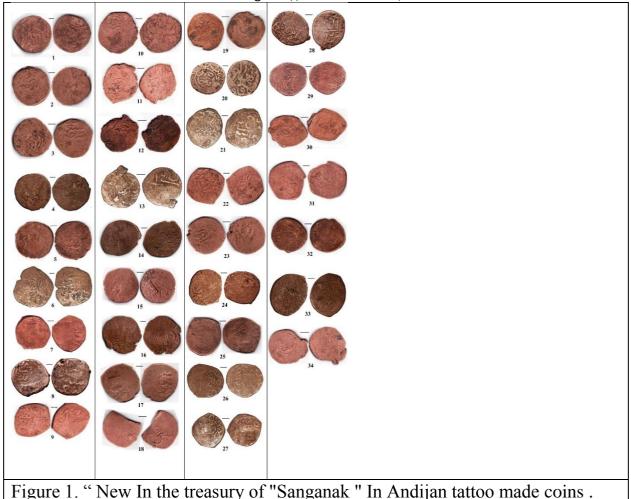
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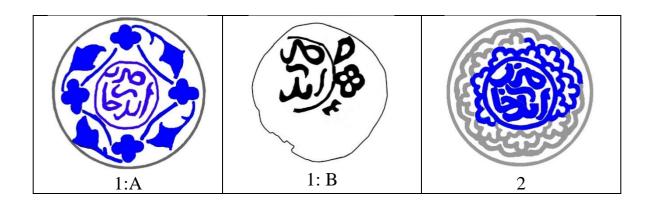
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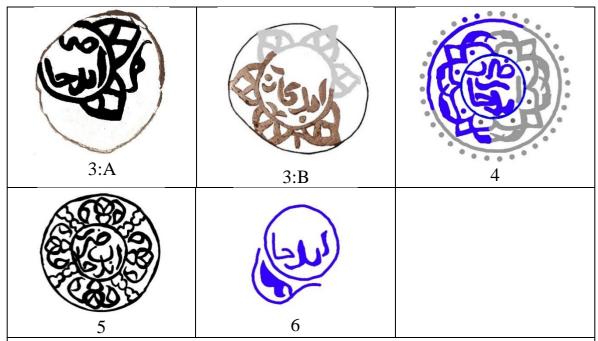


Figure 2. Graphically restored view of the obverse of the coins minted in Andijan from the "Yangi Sanganak" treasury. 1:A) type 1 option "A"; 1: B) type 1 option "B"; 2) type 2; 3:A) type 1 option "A"; 3: B) type 1 option "B"; 4) type 4; 5th round; 6th round.

Obverse: Inside a ring surrounded by six triangular ornaments, as on coins of types 1–2, اندجان the inscription "zarb Andijan ()" is engraved (Figure 2: 3A).

Reverse: After the inscription "fi altarih sana (في التاريخ سنة)", the year of minting of the coin is inscribed in words. However, some of the inscriptions did not appear on the coin, and some of them were flattened. Therefore, it was not possible to determine the year they were inscribed.

Variant B. The weight of one coin in variant B of type 3 is 4.6 grams, and the diameter is 21-26 mm (Figure 1:28).

Front side: As in the A-variant of type 3, inside a frame surrounded by six triangular ornaments, there is the inscription "zarb Andikon (or "zarb Andikon") (فعرب / اندكان / اندكان

Back side: Like the coins mentioned above, في التاريخ سنة the year of minting of the coin was inscribed with the words "fi altarih sana ()" after the inscription. However, some of the inscriptions did not appear on the coin, and some were flattened. Therefore, it was not possible to determine the year inscribed on this coin.

similar to the 3rd type of coins of the "New Sanganak" hoard were found by L. Yu. Shpenyova to have been minted in 898–899 AH (1492–1494 AD) (Шпенёва Л. Ю., 1991. — Р. 207-210.) . However, it should also be noted that although it was not possible to determine the year of minting on the coins studied by A.M. Kamyshev, he determined the dates identified by L. Yu. Shpenyova by the years on the coins (Камышев А.М., 2013. — Р. 8.) .

Type 4. There are two coins of type 4 in the hoard (Figures 1:29-1:30), one of which weighs 4.6 g., diameter -24-26 mm., the other weighs 5.1 g.,

diameter – 22–27 mm.

Front side: edge It is surrounded by dots and a ring along the entire length. In the middle part, inside a border surrounded by four plant-like ornaments, اندجان the inscription "zarb Andijan ()" is inscribed, as on coins of types 1—3. However, the main part of the inscription and ornaments has been flattened (Fig. 2:4).

Back side: After the inscription " fi altarih sana (في التاريخ سنة)", the year of minting of the coin is written in words. However, some of the inscriptions did not appear on the coin, and some of them were flattened.

The obverse decoration of the coins of the 4th type minted in Andijan in the treasury is exactly similar to the coins of Samarkand, Bukhara and Tashkent minted in the years 898–900 AH (AD) (Davidovich E.A., 1983. – P. 79. Fig. 9:4b.) . This suggests that the 4th type coin was minted between the above years.

Type 5. There are 3 coins of this type, their weight is 4.3-5.2 grams, diameter is 21-25 mm (Figures 1:31 – 1:33).

Front side: surrounded by a ring along the edge. In the middle, there is a decoration in the form of a plant leaf with branches rising from the middle and twisted to both sides, located one after the other around the circumference, and a ring with a double wavy "X"-shaped border separating these decorations from each other, and اندجان / باندجان the inscription "zarb Andijan ()" is engraved inside (2: 5 - picture).

Back side: After the inscription " fi altarih sana (
في التاريخ سنة)", the year of minting of the coin was written in words. However, some of the inscriptions did not get on the coin, some were flattened. When restoring the inscriptions on common coins, it was possible to identify the inscription " ثمانمائة (thamanimiaya – eight hundred) و (and) و (tisewun – ninety) و (and) …?"

Type 6. This type of coin is one piece. Its weight is 4.5 grams, diameter is 23-26 mm.

Front side: the inscription "zarb Andijan ()" is engraved inside a ring surrounded by a decorative leaf-snake-shaped branch (اندجان / Figure 2: 6).

On the reverse: After the inscription "fi altarih sana (
في التاريخ سنة)", the year of minting is written in words. But it has disappeared.

II. Re-coinages of the "New Sanganak" treasury coins minted in Andijan.

Some coins minted in Andijan in the "New

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Sanganak" treasury were re-minted in three types: reprints with a square ()-shaped border. Inside the border of this shape is written "xub ()" in Arabic letters (Figures 3:1a-3:1b);

2- Restrike with a border in the shape of a three-leaf (). The main part of the border in this shape has disappeared, and the number ^{9,9,6} (998) is preserved on one of its inner edges (Figure 3:2);

Restrike with a border in the shape of a four-leaf clover (). This type of restrike has the inscription "...mon kon"

in Arabic letters inside the border (Figure 3:3).

Re-strucks were made on 5 coins of the A-variant of the 1st series, 4 of which were re-struck once on one side, and 1 coin was re-struck once on both sides. Also, one coin of the A-variant of the 3rd series and one coin whose inscription could not be determined were restruck once. Of the re-coinages, the first type with the inscription "xub ()" in a square frame was minted on four coins, and the remaining types were minted on

one coin each. Studies have shown that re-coinages with the inscription "xub ()" in a square frame were minted between 907–914 AH (Davidovich E.A., 1979. – P. 370; Davidovich E.A., 1983. – P. 111–113.) . The presence of this type of re-coinages on Andijan coins also indicates that they were re-circulated during the Shaybanid period.

CONCLUSION

From the above, it becomes clear that the coins minted in Andijan from the "Yangi Sanganak" hoard, found in the Parkent district of the Tashkent region, were minted and put into circulation in the last years of the 15th century. The period of minting of these coins coincides with the last stage of the reign of Umar Sheikh Mirza (1466-1494), one of the famous princes of the Timurid state, the father of the shah and poet Zahiriddin Muhammad Babur, in the Fergana region. At the same time, the minting process in Andijan was carried out simultaneously with the introduction of new monetary units, as in other regions of the Timurids. Interestingly, these coins were not immediately canceled after Muhammad Shaybani Khan seized power in Central Asia, but were left in circulation. As a result of the monetary reforms carried out by the Shaybani dynasty, the coins minted in Andijan during the reign of Umar Sheikh Mirza were reminted, eliminating the shortage in the monetary system. According to the results of the study of the geography of the distribution of these coins produced in Andijan, they were widely used not only in the Fergana Valley, but also in cities in the territories of present-day Uzbekistan, Kazakhstan, Tajikistan and

Kyrgyzstan, as well as in villages located along trade routes. This indicates the economic importance of Andijan at that time and the place of monetary units in trade circulation. The main source of information is the "Yangi Sanganak" hoard, which allows us to understand the economic and political importance of Andijan in the 15th-16th centuries in more detail.
